Holli Drummond is an associate professor of sociology at Western Kentucky University. Her primary research seeks to explain variation in the social psychological processes leading to juvenile delinquency and how such processes are shaped by family, peers, school, and community. Further interests include evaluating the effectiveness of juvenile correctional policies and programs seeking to positively impact the above mentioned processes.

Melani Duvall received her M.A. in sociology from the University of Louisville in 2012 and completed her undergraduate work at Eastern Kentucky University. She has volunteered at a rape crisis center and worked as an advocate for victims of domestic violence at a local shelter. Her research interests include men's violence against women and masculinities theory with a focus on educating men about sexual assault prevention.

Patricia Gagne is an associate professor in the department of sociology at the University of Louisville where she teaches courses on sociological theory, qualitative methods, and gender and sexuality. She has published articles on intimate partner violence, the battered women's clemency movement, transgenderism, body modification, adventure touring motorcyclist communities, the commodification of motorcycling culture, corporate logo tattoos, and qualitative methods.

Cheryl Lero Jonson is an assistant professor in the department of criminal justice at Xavier University. She received her Ph.D. in 2010 in criminal justice from the University of Cincinnati. Her publications include *Correctional Theory: Context and Consequences*, *The American Prison: Imagining a Different Future*, and *The Origins of American Criminology*. Her work has appeared in *Criminology and Public Policy*, *Crime and Justice: A Review of Research*, and *Victims and Offenders*. Her current research interests focus on the impact of prison on recidivism, sources of inmate violence, the use of meta-analysis to organize criminological knowledge, early intervention and crime prevention, and work-family conflict among law enforcement officials.

Tanja Link is an assistant professor in the department of sociology & criminal justice at Kennesaw State University. She went to law school in Germany and received her Ph.D. at the University of Georgia. Her teaching and research interests focus on specific issues regarding international and comparative crime and justice, juvenile delinquency and justice, as well as research on drugs and alcohol. Dr. Link's research has been published in *Gender and Education*, *the European Journal of Criminology*, *the Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs*, *the Journal of Ethnicity in Substance Abuse*, and *the Journal of Drug Education*.

Danielle McDonald is an associate professor of criminal justice at Northern Kentucky University. She received her Ph.D. in criminology from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. In addition, Dr. McDonald received her Masters in sociology from Virginia Tech and her bachelors in psychology and sociology from West Virginia University. She has taught a variety of criminal justice courses, but her current research and teaching interests lie in the area of community corrections and reentry.

James Robert Masterson is an assistant professor of government at Morehead State University and Director of International Education. Dr. Masterson has a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Cincinnati. His research focuses on international relations theory and research methodology with specialization in international political economy. His research interests include the international relations of East Asia in general and analyzing the nexus between Chinese foreign and economic relations with the world in particular. His publication in *China Information* examines the effects economic factors have on Chinese political relations with its neighbors from 1987-2001. His forthcoming book chapter in *Revolutionizing the Interaction between State and Citizens through Digital Communications* examines how the use of social media in China impacts government policy. Professor Masterson teaches courses on International Relations Theory, Current World Problems, US Foreign Policy, Asian Politics and Comparative Politics.

Jennifer McMahan-Howard is an assistant professor in the department of sociology and criminal justice at Kennesaw State University. She earned her PhD in sociology from the University of Georgia with a concentration in Crime, Law, and Deviance. Her current research focuses on victimization, the commercial sexual exploitation of children, human trafficking, and legal change. Dr. McMahan-Howard's research has been published in *Law & Society Review*, *Violence & Victims*, the *Journal of Interpersonal Violence*, and *Evaluation & Program Planning*.

Ryan D. Schroeder is an associate professor of sociology at the University of Louisville. His research interests include desistance process, with a particular focus on the role of emotional development, family functioning, and religious process.

Katie Smith received a B.S. in psychology and a M.A. in criminal justice from Kennesaw State University. Some of her areas of interest include violence against women and children, juvenile justice, and rehabilitation within the justice system.

Rachel E. Stein is an assistant professor of sociology at West Virginia University. Her research focuses on opportunities that lead to crime and victimization. She has published several research articles using hierarchical linear models to explore cross-national multilevel opportunities of victimization. Her recent work explores neighborhood crime and fear of crime using broken windows and collective efficacy theories.

Paul D. Steele is a professor of criminology and sociology at Morehead State University. He is the Director of the Center for Justice Studies, and emeritus Professor at the University of New Mexico, where he was the Director of the Criminal Justice Analysis Center, the statistical analysis center for the state. His research interests include the organizational functioning of the criminal justice system, the causes and social responses to child sexual abuse, issues in corrections, and program evaluation research. His recent publications concern child sexual abuse by members of the clergy, spatial aspects of violent crimes committed by gang members, programs for the effective prevention and intervention with street gangs, and issues related to the sexual abuse of children in Indian Country.
